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

NOTE: This expansion base is *not* compatible with the Armada 1000, 3000, 4000, 6000, 7000, or V series portable computers.







Selecting the Voltage

Be sure to select the voltage for your country with the voltage select switch.



CAUTION: Ensure that the voltage select switch is in the correct position (115 VAC or 230 VAC). Failure to do so results in damage to the equipment.



Connecting External Equipment

In addition to reading this section, refer to the documentation included with the external equipment.

- 1. If the computer is docked, shut down the computer and turn off the external equipment that you want to connect.
- 2. Remove the connector cover **①**.
- 3. Connect the external equipment cable to the corresponding connector on the expansion base 2.



- 4. Replace the connector cover.
- 5. If applicable, plug the power cord of the new equipment into a grounded electrical outlet.

Using the Monitor Support Cover


If you are using a monitor support cover, you can place the external monitor directly over your computer.



WARNING: To avoid the risk of personal injury or structural damage to the monitor support cover or expansion base, do not place monitors with unstable bases or monitors heavier than 75 pounds (45 kilograms) on the monitor support cover. If you are using a monitor with an unstable base or one that is heavier than 75 pounds, place it on a work surface next to the expansion base.

1. Place the monitor support cover front leg into the monitor support cover recess • in the front of the expansion base. Push the rear monitor support cover latch into the monitor latch slot • until it *snaps* into place.

NOTE: If the monitor support cover latch is not level with the base of the monitor support cover, the monitor support cover is not latched securely.



- 2. Make sure that the power switch on the external monitor is turned off.
- 3. Connect the monitor cable to the external monitor connector on the rear panel of the expansion base.



4. Place the base of the external monitor on the flat area in the center rear of the monitor support cover.




5. Plug the monitor power cord into a grounded electrical outlet.

Connecting the Power Cord

- 1. Plug the power cord into the expansion base power connector.
- 2. Plug the pronged end of the power cord into a grounded electrical outlet.

NOTE: If you are connecting the expansion base in Japan, you must first plug the 3-prong power cord into a 3-to-2-prong plug adapter, then plug the adapter into a grounded electrical outlet.



NOTE: When the computer is not docked in the expansion base, the power switch on the right side of the expansion base moves if pushed, but the switch is not functional.

Connecting to a LAN (Local Area Network)

To connect to a LAN through the expansion base, you must have:

- A PCI network interface card (NIC) installed in the expansion base.
- An unshielded twisted pair cable with RJ-45 jacks at each end. Request the cable from your network administrator or Compag authorized dealer, reseller, or service provider.



WARNING: To reduce the risk of electrical shock, fire, or damage to the device, do not plug a telephone cable into the Ethernet RJ-45 jack.

To connect to a LAN through the expansion base:

- 1. Plug the network cable into the NIC RJ-45 jack on the right side of the expansion base.
- 2. Plug the other end of the network cable into the network jack.

NOTE: Be sure both jacks are seated.

Inserting PC Cards

If your expansion base contains a PCI CardBus Reader, you must insert the PC Card label side down into the PC Card slot. For more information about using PC Cards, see the guide that came with your computer.

Customizing the System

The total number of devices in the system depends on your computer MultiBay device support.

chapter 7

DOCKING AND UNDOCKING

Docking the Computer



WARNING: Misuse of your personal computer or failure to establish a safe and comfortable workstation may result in discomfort or serious injury. Refer to the computer Safety & Comfort Guide for more information on choosing a workspace and creating a safe and comfortable work environment.




WARNING: To avoid the risk of personal injury, keep fingers and hands away from the rear of the computer when docking.

IMPORTANT: If you plan to leave the computer docked for an extended period without using it, shut down the system.

NOTE: It is necessary to connect an external keyboard and mouse when using the computer in the expansion base.

- 1. Prepare the computer for docking:
 - If the computer is running Microsoft Windows 95, Microsoft Windows 98, or Microsoft Windows 2000 **Professional**—The computer can be docked while it is on, off, or in Suspend, but not while it is in Hibernation. If the computer is in Hibernation, exit Hibernation by pressing the suspend button, sliding the power switch, or pressing **Fn** + the suspend button.
 - If the computer is running Microsoft Windows NT **Workstation 4.0**—Turn off the computer before docking by selecting Start > Shut Down Windows > Shut down.
- 2. Turn off and disconnect external equipment connected to the computer.
- 3. Make sure that the power cord is plugged into the expansion base and into a grounded electrical outlet.

- 4. Close the computer (optional, if the monitor support cover is not installed on the expansion base).
- 5. If your computer has a mobile expansion unit, connect it to the computer.
- 6. Slide the computer into the expansion base along the left alignment guide **1**.
- 7. Push the computer toward the rear of the expansion base 2 until the docking connectors on the computer and the expansion base come into contact and the automatic docking mechanism pulls the computer into a complete connection.



8. If the monitor support cover is not installed, open the computer display **3**.



9. Optional: Lock the keylock that secures the computer to the expansion base.

Turning On the System

- 1. Turn on external equipment connected to the expansion base.
- 2. Turn on the system (computer and expansion base) by using the power switch on the expansion base or the power switch on the computer.

The expansion base remains on whenever the power cord is connected to the expansion base and an electrical outlet.

Using the Expansion Base Suspend Button

- When the system is off, pressing the suspend button turns the system on.
- When the system is on, pressing the suspend button initiates Suspend.
- When the system is in Suspend, pressing the suspend button exits Suspend.

Using the Expansion Base Power/Suspend Light

When the power/suspend light is

- On, the system is on.
- Blinking, the system is in Suspend.
- Off, the system is either off or in Hibernation.

Undocking the Computer

Undocking Automatically

- 1. Turn off and disconnect external equipment connected directly to the computer.
- 2. If the computer is open, close it.
- 3. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the keylock.
- 4. Prepare the computer for undocking:
 - If the computer is running Windows 95, Windows 98, or Windows 2000 Professional—The computer can be undocked while it is on, off, or in Suspend, but not while it is in Hibernation. If the computer is in Hibernation, exit Hibernation by pressing the suspend button, sliding the power switch, or pressing **Fn** + the suspend button.
 - If the computer is running Windows NT 4.0—Turn off the computer before undocking by selecting Start > Shut Down Windows > Shut down.
- 5. Press the computer eject button on the expansion base.
- 6. When the automatic undocking process is complete, slide the computer out of the expansion base.



Undocking Manually


The automatic undocking mechanism requires electricity. If power becomes unavailable to the expansion base while the computer is docked, you can release the computer from the expansion base by using the manual release button behind the rear panel of the expansion base.

Before You Begin

- 1. Shut down the computer.
- 2. Remove the external monitor and monitor support cover, if in place.
- 3. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the keylock.
- 4. Turn off and disconnect the external equipment.
- 5. Disconnect the power cord.

Removing the Rear Panel


- 1. Position the expansion base so that the rear panel is facing you.
- 2. Remove the connector cover.



3. Slide the rear panel release latch left to the open position.




4. Using both hands, grasp the bottom edge of the rear panel and swing the bottom out and up until it disengages.



5. Lift the rear panel up and off from the expansion base.

6. Slide the manual release button to the right.



- 7. Slide the computer out of the expansion base.
- 8. Replace the rear panel by inserting the tabs on the top of the rear panel into the slots on the top cover and chassis. When the tabs are in the slots, pivot the bottom of the rear panel downward until it is seated.
- 9. Secure the rear panel by moving the rear panel release latch right to the closed position.
- 10. Replace the connector cover by sliding it back into place.
- 11. Reconnect the power cord and external equipment cables to the expansion base.

SECURING THE SYSTEM

Using the Keylock


Two identical security keys are attached to the U-bolt at the rear of the expansion base. The second key is provided as a spare.

When the expansion base is locked with its key while the computer is docked, the system is secured as follows:

- The computer is secured to the expansion base and the automatic docking mechanism is disabled.
- Access to removable devices in the computer is unavailable.
- The MultiBay release buttons are locked, which prevents the removal of MultiBay devices in the expansion base. (A medium, such as a diskette or CD-ROM inserted in a MultiBay device, is not secured.)
- The rear panel release latch is disabled, which prevents the removal of the expansion base rear panel. This denies access to
 - □ PCI expansion board(s) installed in the expansion base.
 - ☐ The manual release button, which manually disconnects the computer from the expansion base.

Locking and Unlocking the System

- 1. Insert the key into the keylock.
- 2. Turn the key 120 degrees clockwise to lock the system. Turn the key 120 degrees counterclockwise to unlock the system.



Expansion Base Key and Keylock Replacement

A two-letter code identifies your keys. It appears on both keys and the keylock. To replace a lost or stolen key, contact the Fort Lock Corporation:

Supply the two-letter key code and your key will be replaced.

To replace the keylock assembly and obtain a different key, contact your Compaq authorized dealer, reseller, or service provider.

Connecting Security Cables

The security cable slot on the right side of the expansion base can be used to attach an optional security cable lock. To obtain a security cable lock, contact your Compaq authorized dealer, reseller, or service provider.

The U-bolt on the metal frame of the expansion base can be used to attach a heavy-duty cable of your choice.

Connecting a Cable to the Security Cable Slot

- 1. Loop the cable around the fixed object to which you want to secure the expansion base.
- 2. Insert the cable lock end of the cable through the loop end of the cable.
- 3. Insert the cable lock into the security cable slot.
- 4. Lock the cable lock with its key.



Connecting a Cable to the U-Bolt

- 1. Loop the cable around the fixed object to which you want to secure the expansion base.
- 2. Put one end of the cable through the U-bolt.

Lock the ends of the cable together using a locking device attached to the cable or a padlock.

USING MULTIBAY AND HALF-HEIGHT DRIVES


Using MultiBay Drives

The Dual MultiBay supports the following drive sizes:

17-mm drive—Fills both MultiBays

or

12-mm drive—One each in the top and bottom MultiBays



Selecting a MultiBay Drive Adapter

- A 12.7-mm or 17-mm hard drive must be placed in an adapter before the drive can be used in a MultiBay.
- A 12.7-mm drive other than a hard drive can be inserted into the top or bottom MultiBay without an adapter.

Inserting a Hard Drive into a Hard Drive Adapter

A hard drive must be placed in an adapter before the drive can be used in the MultiBay. Refer to the guide that came with your computer for instructions on inserting the drive in its adapter.

Inserting or Removing a MultiBay Drive



CAUTION: Support for the insertion or removal of MultiBay drives while the computer is on, in Suspend, or in Hibernation varies by operating system. To prevent damage to the computer and the drive and loss of work, follow the instructions below before inserting or removing any drive.

- 1. If the system is on or in Suspend or Hibernation, prepare the system or the drive for the insertion or removal as required by your operating system:
 - Windows 95 or Windows 98 (factory installed)—Shut down the system before inserting or removing a *hard drive*.
 - Windows NT 4.0 (factory installed)—Shut down the system before inserting or removing *any drive*.
 - Windows 2000 Professional—If you are removing a *hard drive*, use the Unplug or Eject Hardware utility to turn off the drive before you remove it.
 - Windows 95 or Windows 98 (retail version without software enhancements from Compaq)—Shut down the system before inserting or removing *any drive*.


NOTE: For information about obtaining Compaq software enhancements for a retail version of Windows 95 or Windows 98, visit the Compaq website at http://www.compaq.com or contact your Compaq authorized dealer, reseller, or service provider.

- 2. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the keylock.
- 3. Remove any media from the drive.

- 4. Insert or remove the drive or drive assembly (a drive inserted in an adapter):
 - To insert a drive or drive assembly—With the connector facing the computer, slide the drive or drive assembly into the MultiBay until it is seated.

NOTE: Align a 17-mm drive assembly, which fills both the top and bottom MultiBays, as if you are inserting it into the bottom MultiBay.


This illustration shows the insertion of a 17-mm drive into the Dual MultiBay.



■ To remove a drive or drive assembly—

- □ If the drive is in the top MultiBay, push the top MultiBay release button and pull the drive out of the MultiBay .
- □ If the drive is in the bottom MultiBay or is filling both the top and bottom MultiBays, push the bottom MultiBay release button and pull the drive out of the MultiBay.

This illustration shows the removal of a 12-mm drive from the top MultiBay.



Using a Half-Height Drive

The left bay is an industry standard half-height bay. This bay accommodates a standard 5.25-inch (13.34-cm) half-height drive.

Installing a Half-Height Drive

In addition to the information in this section, refer to the documentation included with the drive.


NOTE: Use slotted Torx T-10 and T-15 screwdrivers.

Before You Begin

- 1. Shut down the computer.
- 2. Remove the external monitor and monitor support cover, if they are being used.
- 3. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the keylock.
- 4. Undock the computer.
- 5. Turn off and disconnect external equipment.
- 6. Disconnect the power cord.

Removing the Rear Panel


- 1. Position the expansion base so that the rear panel is facing you.
- Remove the connector cover.



3. Slide the rear panel release latch left to the open position.



4. Using both hands, grasp the bottom edge of the rear panel and swing the bottom out and up until it disengages.




5. When you feel the rear panel detach from the top cover of the expansion base, lift it up and off.

Removing the Top Cover




CAUTION: Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage electronic components. Before beginning this procedure, ensure that you are properly grounded. For more information, refer to Appendix B, "Electrostatic Discharge."

- 1. Position the expansion base so that the front is facing you.
- 2. Peel back and remove the label from the alignment tray.
- 3. Remove the screw behind the retaining latch .
- 4. Remove the alignment tray by pulling the retaining latch up and forward .



5. Remove the five screws from the top cover.




- 6. Using both hands, grasp the top outside edges of the top cover.
- 7. Lift the back edge of the top cover and swing it forward so that it pivots off the expansion base along the front edge.




Removing the Drive Cage

1. Remove the three screws securing the drive cage to the expansion base.




2. Lift the drive cage out of the expansion base.




Inserting the Half-Height Drive into the Drive Cage

1. Remove the half-height bay blank bezel from the front of the drive cage by pressing in on the tabs holding the bezel to the drive cage. This bezel will be replaced by the front of the halfheight drive.

NOTE: Retain this bezel. You will need it if you remove and do not replace the half-height drive you are installing.




2. If installed, remove the four screws from the drive (two screws on each side).



- 3. Place the drive cage over the half-height drive.
- 4. Attach the drive cage to the half-height drive by inserting the four screws loosely through the drive cage and into the halfheight drive.

NOTE: Two sets of screw holes are provided on each side of the drive cage. Select the pairs of holes that match the holes in the sides of the half-height drive.


5. Align the front cover of the half-height drive with the front edge of the tab on the inside edge of the drive cage.




6. Tighten the four screws that secure the drive cage to the halfheight drive.

Inserting the Drive Cage Assembly into the Expansion Base

- 1. Attach the cables on the back of the half-height drive to the connectors on the expansion base. Refer to the documentation included with the half-height drive for information on expansion base connectors.
- 2. Align the base tabs on the right side of the drive cage with the ribs on the bottom of the expansion base.




- 3. Place the drive cage assembly on the bottom of the expansion base.
- 4. Replace the three screws that secure the drive cage to the expansion base.



Replacing the Top Cover


- 1. Replace the expansion base top cover by aligning its two front corners with the two front corners of the expansion base. Then push down in the center of the top cover assembly until it is seated.
- 2. Replace the five screws on the top cover.



3. Replace the alignment tray by sliding it straight back until it clicks into place.

4. Replace the screw behind the retaining latch.

NOTE: Compaq recommends you replace the label after replacing the alignment tray.



Replacing the Rear Panel

- 1. Position the expansion base so that its rear panel is facing you.
- 2. Replace the rear panel by inserting the tabs on the top of the rear panel into the slots in the top cover. When the tabs are in the slots, pivot the bottom of the rear panel downward until it is seated.
- 3. Slide the rear panel release latch to the closed position.
- 4. Replace the connector cover.
- 5. Reconnect the external equipment cables and power cord to the expansion base.

Removing a Half-Height Drive


NOTE: Use slotted Torx T-15 and T-10 screwdrivers.

1. Follow the procedures described under "Before You Begin," "Removing the Rear Panel," and "Removing the Top Cover" in "Installing a Half-Height Bay Drive" earlier in this chapter.




CAUTION: Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage electronic components. Before beginning this procedure, ensure that you are properly grounded. Refer to Appendix B, "Electrostatic Discharge."

2. After you have removed the top cover, remove the three screws securing the metal drive cage to the expansion base.




3. Disconnect the half-height drive cables from the expansion base.


4. Lift the drive cage and attached half-height drive out of the expansion base.




5. Remove the four screws attaching the drive cage to the halfheight drive (two screws on each side).




- 6. Remove the half-height drive from the drive cage.
- 7. If you are not installing another drive, replace the half-height bay blank bezel by inserting the two tabs on each side of the bezel into the two slots on each side of the drive cage. (This bezel was removed when the half-height drive was installed.)




9. Replace the four screws into the sides of the drive. Use any of the screw holes.



- 9. Align the base tabs on the right side of the drive cage with the ribs on the bottom of the expansion base.
- 10. Place the drive cage on the floor of the expansion base.



11. Replace the three screws that secure the drive cage to the expansion base.



12. Continue reassembling the expansion base by following the procedures described under "Replacing the Top Cover" and "Replacing the Rear Panel."

Formatting a Hard Drive in the Expansion Base

PREFDISK is a utility designed to partition a hard drive installed in an expansion base under Windows 95 or Windows 98.

The PREFDISK utility can be obtained from a CD-ROM in the Quick Restore package included with the computer or from the Compaq website as a SoftPaq file.

To obtain the utility from the QuickRestore CD-ROM and run PREFDISK, follow the instructions in this section and in the *Quick Restore Instruction Guide*. To obtain the utility from the Compaq website, visit the site at http://www.compaq.com. Instructions for using the SoftPaq and running PREFDISK are provided in this section, on the website, and in a README file with the SoftPaq.

Both the Quick Restore package and the website sources require a diskette.

Extracting from the QuickRestore CD-ROM

To extract the PREFDISK utility:

1. Insert the QuickRestore CD-ROM included with your computer into the CD-ROM drive.

Some computers are shipped with one CD-ROM, others with two CD-ROMs:

- If you have one CD-ROM, select Application Recovery when prompted.
- If you have two CD-ROMs, use the QuickRestore CD-ROM and the Application Recovery CD-ROM.

NOTE: If the utility does not run automatically, execute Autorun.exe as follows.

- From Windows Explorer, go to the CD-ROM drive.
- Open the Program folder and double-click on Autorun.exe.
- 2. Follow the instructions on the screen to extract the PREFDISK utility.
- 3. Exit the Application Recovery utility.
- 4. Go to the location on your hard drive where you saved the PREFDISK utility.

- 5. Open the Disk 1 folder and execute the Makedisk.bat file.
- 6. Follow the instructions on the screen to create a bootable system diskette.
- 7. Restart the computer with the diskette in drive A.
- 8. From the FDISK menu, partition the hard drive.
- 9. Remove the diskette from drive A and restart the computer.
- 10. Format the hard drive.

Downloading from the Compaq Website

To run the PREFDISK utility:

- 1. Download the SoftPaq file to a directory of your choice and go to that directory.
- 2. Execute the SoftPaq file by double-clicking on the SoftPaq executable file.
- 3. Open the Disk 1 folder and execute the Makedisk.bat file.
- 4. Follow the instructions on the screen to create a bootable system diskette.
- 5. Restart the computer with the diskette in drive A.
- 6. From the FDISK menu, partition the hard drive.
- 7. Remove the diskette from drive A and restart the computer.
- 8. Format the hard drive.

Changing the Startup Sequence with MultiBoot

When more than one drive is in the system, the computer selects the drive to start from by searching sequenced locations for, first, a bootable CD-ROM or DVD-ROM; second, a bootable diskette; and third, a bootable hard drive.

NOTE: A bootable device or medium contains files needed by the computer to start up and operate properly.

The computer can start from

- Any bootable hard drive or bootable drive medium, such as a diskette, CD-ROM, DVD-ROM, or disk, in the computer.
- Any bootable diskette in the external diskette drive bay.
- Any bootable diskette (but not a SuperDisk LS-120 drive disk) in the expansion base.
- Any bootable peripheral interconnect (PCI) network adapter board in the computer.

By default, Phoenix MultiBoot is disabled, and the computer selects the startup drive by searching the following locations in this sequence:

- 1. External diskette drive bay (included with some computer models)
- 2. Computer MultiBay 1—Top MultiBay, if the computer has a Dual MultiBay

or

Computer MultiBay—If the computer has only one MultiBay.

- 3. Computer MultiBay 2—Bottom MultiBay, if the computer has a Dual MultiBay
- 4. Computer hard drive bay
- 5. Left expansion base MultiBay (half-height drive)
- 6. Right top expansion base MultiBay
- 7. Right bottom expansion base MultiBay
- 8. Computer Ethernet network interface card (NIC)
- 9. Expansion base Ethernet network interface card in PCI expansion slot 1
- 10. Expansion base Ethernet network interface card in PCI expansion slot 2

11. Expansion base Ethernet network interface card in PCI expansion slot 3

You can change the sequence in which the computer searches for a startup device by enabling MultiBoot and entering a different startup sequence. When the computer restarts and searches for a startup drive, it considers only the first drive of each type. For example, in the default boot order, the computer will not start from a bootable diskette drive diskette in an expansion base if a non-bootable diskette drive diskette is in a computer MultiBay.

IMPORTANT: Changing the boot order also changes the logical drive designations. For example, if you start up from a hard drive in the computer MultiBay, it becomes drive C and a hard drive in the hard drive bay becomes drive D. Starting up from a network card does not affect logical drive designations.

Selecting a MultiBoot Utility

You can enable MultiBoot and change the sequence of the computer drive bay locations that the computer searches during startup by using Computer Setup, available on all computer models, or by using Compaq Computer Security, a Windowsbased utility available on some computer models.

- Computer Setup can be used even when your operating system is not working or will not load.
- In Computer Setup the list of bootable devices includes only the bootable devices currently in the computer or an optional docking base. The external diskette drive bay does not list in the boot order field, but is always searched first for a bootable diskette.
- In Compaq Computer Security the list of bootable devices includes all bootable devices supported by the BIOS. If you set a boot sequence for a bootable device that is not currently in the system, the device will be included in the boot sequence when it is present and ignored when it is not present.

Changing the Startup Sequence in Computer Setup

- 1. Restart the computer, then press **F10** when the blinking cursor appears upper-right on the screen.
 - To change the language, press **F2**.
 - For navigation instructions, press **F1**.

- 2. Select Advanced Boot Options, then press **Enter.**
- 3. Toggle the MultiBoot field to Enable.
- 4. Toggle the Boot Order fields to the boot sequence you prefer.

NOTE: If the computer has a Dual MultiBay, the Boot Order field for the computer bottom MultiBay is MultiBay-1; the Boot Order field for the computer top MultiBay is MultiBay-2. Use MultiBay-1 as the field for a 17-mm drive that fills both the top and bottom MultiBays.

- 5. To save your preferences and exit Boot Options, press **F10**.
- 6. To confirm saving your changes, close Computer Setup, and restart the computer, select File Save Changes and Exit, then press F10.

Changing the Startup Sequence in Compaq Computer Security

- 1. Access the Compaq Computer Security window:
 - Select Start Settings Control Panel. Select the Compaq Computer Security icon.
 - Right-click the Compaq Computer Security icon in the Windows taskbar, then select Security Properties.
- 2. Select the Boot Security tab.
- 3. Select the Enable Multi-Boot checkbox.
- 4. Use the Move Up and Move Down buttons to display your preferences in the Boot Order list.

NOTE: Both buttons are inactive until the Enable MultiBoot box is selected. The Move Up button is inactive if the selected item is at the top of the Boot Order List. The Move Down button is inactive if the selected item is at the bottom of the Boot Order List.

5. Select the OK button.

chapter 5

CHARGING BATTERY PACKS

IMPORTANT: Only a lithium ion battery pack can be charged in the expansion base.

Charging a Battery Pack

A battery pack

- Can be charged only in the bottom MultiBay.
- Begins to charge as soon as it is inserted into the expansion base MultiBay.
- Charges in the expansion base MultiBay whether or not the computer is docked.
- Charges in the computer whenever the computer is docked in the expansion base.

When a battery pack is inserted into the expansion base bottom MultiBay, the MultiBay light

- Turns on while the battery pack is charging.
- Turns off when the battery pack is fully charged.

Charging Multiple Battery Packs


Battery packs charge in this sequence:

- 1. Primary battery pack in the computer battery bay.
- 2. Spare battery pack in the computer MultiBay.
- 3. Spare battery pack in the expansion base bottom MultiBay.

A battery pack that is charging is not interrupted if a battery pack is inserted into a bay that normally charges before it. The first battery pack continues charging until it has a full charge. The system then charges the next battery pack in the charging sequence.


Inserting a MultiBay Battery Pack

- 1. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the expansion base keylock.
- 2. Insert the battery pack into the bottom MultiBay with the connector facing in.
- 3. Push the battery pack into the bottom MultiBay until it is seated.



Removing a MultiBay Battery Pack

- 1. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the keylock.
- 2. Push the bottom MultiBay release button .
- 3. Pull the battery pack out of the bottom MultiBay .





INSTALLING AND REMOVING AN EXPANSION BOARD

Installing a PCI Expansion Board

If you are installing an expansion board that requires a cable connection to a drive bay, such as a SCSI controller, refer to the documentation included with the expansion board.


NOTE: Use a Torx T-15 screwdriver.

Before You Begin

- 1. Shut down the computer.
- 2. Remove the external monitor and monitor support cover, if in place.
- 3. If the expansion base is locked, unlock the keylock.
- 4. Undock the computer.
- 5. Turn off and disconnect external equipment.
- 6. Disconnect the power cord.

Removing the Rear Panel


- 1. Position the expansion base so that its rear panel is facing you.
- 2. Remove the connector cover.



3. Slide the rear panel release latch left to the open position.



4. Using both hands, grasp the bottom edge of the rear panel and swing the bottom out and up until it disengages.



5. When you feel the rear panel detach from the top cover of the expansion base, lift it up and off.

Removing the Expansion Slot Cover




CAUTION: Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage electronic components. Before beginning this procedure, ensure that you are properly grounded. Refer to Appendix B, "Electrostatic Discharge."

Your expansion base configuration may include one or more installed PCI cards.

1. Find the three expansion slot covers **①**, **②**, and **③**. You can install a PCI expansion board in any of the three slots. Select the slot you want to use, depending on the size of the expansion board you are using.

A half-sized expansion board can be installed in slots **①**, **②**, and **3**. A full-sized expansion board can be installed only in slot **3**.




2. Remove the screw that secures the expansion slot cover to the chassis. This screw will be used later to secure the newly installed expansion board.

3. Remove the expansion slot cover.


Retain the expansion slot cover. You will need it if you remove the expansion board and replace it with another expansion board.

Inserting the Expansion Board


1. The three PCI expansion slot connectors correspond with the three external PCI card slots on the outside of the expansion base.



2. Align the bracket **1** on the side of the expansion board with the expansion slot **2**.

NOTE: If you are installing a full-sized expansion board, insert it into slot 3.

- 3. Push the expansion board straight into the expansion slot until the connectors are seated.
- 4. If the expansion board has a cable, refer to the documentation included with the board for connection information.
- 5. Fasten the expansion board bracket to the chassis with the screw 3 that you removed from the expansion slot cover. The illustration shows inserting a half-sized expansion board in slot 3.



Replacing the Rear Panel

- 1. Replace the rear panel by inserting the tabs on the top of the rear panel into the slots in the top cover. When the tabs are in the slots, pivot the bottom of the rear panel downward until it is seated.
- 2. Secure the rear panel by moving the rear panel release latch right to the closed position.
- 3. Reconnect the external device cables and power cord to the expansion base.

Once an expansion board in one PCI slots is, its external connector is accessed through the PCI card slot on the outside of the expansion base.

IMPORTANT: If you installed a PCI CardBus Reader, you must insert the PC Card label side down into the PC Card slot. For more information about using PC Cards, see the guide that came with your computer.

Removing a PCI Expansion Board

NOTE: Use a Torx T-15 screwdriver.


1. Follow the procedures under "Before You Begin" and "Removing the Rear Panel" in this chapter.


- 2. Remove the screw **1** that is securing the expansion board to the chassis **2**. This screw will be used later for one of the following reasons:
 - If you replace the expansion board that you are removing, you will use the screw to install the new expansion board.
 - If you do not replace the expansion board that you are removing, you will use the screw to replace the expansion slot cover.
- 3. Pull the expansion board straight out.

The illustration shows removing a half-sized expansion board from slot 3.



4. If you are not installing another expansion board in the same expansion slot, replace the expansion slot cover. (This is the slot cover that was removed when the expansion board was installed.) Attach it to the chassis with the screw that you removed in step 2.

This illustration shows replacing the cover in expansion slot 3.



- 5. Replace the connector cover.
- 6. Replace the rear panel by inserting the tabs on the top of the rear panel into the slots in the top cover. When the tabs are in the slots, pivot the bottom downward until it is seated.
- 7. Secure the rear panel by moving the rear panel release latch right to the closed position.
- 8. Reconnect the external equipment cables and power cord.

chapter 7

TROUBLESHOOTING

While your computer is set up for your hardware and software, problems you encounter while working may not be unique. Eliminating the typical problems described in this section may save you time and money. If you have a problem with your system, consider the possible causes and solutions outlined in the following tables. You may discover something you can resolve easily yourself. If the condition persists, contact your Compaq authorized dealer or reseller.

For possible problems that are not specifically related to using the computer with the expansion base, refer to the troubleshooting section in the documentation included with the computer.

Solving System Problems

Solving Network Problems

Refer to these guidelines when you have determined that the computer in the expansion base is not communicating with the network. These guidelines do not discuss the process of debugging the network cabling.

- Ensure that the cabling is securely attached to the expansion base. A loose cable is the most common cause of network problems. If the cable is loose, secure it and see if the computer can communicate with the network.
- Determine whether the current computer or another computer has communicated with the network from the expansion base. If so, determine whether anything was added or changed that could have stopped the network interface from working.
- Run Diagnostics Utilities before installing the network drivers to verify that the network interface is working correctly. Refer to the guide that came with your computer for more information on running Diagnostics Utilities.

appendix R
